Background

- Three Government schemes to help Ukrainians come to the UK:
 - Homes for Ukraine Scheme For Ukrainians with no ties to the UK. Sponsorship by individual hosts to receive accommodation. Expects to accommodate 200k Ukrainians
 - Ukrainian Family Scheme UK nationals with Ukraine ties supported to bring family to UK
 - Ukrainians already in the UK with a visa can extend their visa or switch to another immigration route

Background



- Role / focus of Local Authorities on the Homes for Ukraine Scheme (HfU)
- ▶ **HfU** is the only scheme with funding attached:
 - £10,500 per refugee (inc. one-off £200 subsistence payment)
 - £350 per host 'thank you' (rolling monthly payments max 12-mths)
 - Additional direct schools funding for additional students (early years secondary)
- Whilst focus is on HfU, local refugees via other routes may need support & have same rights to benefits and statutory support. Potential surge in housing demand from all three routes.

HfU scheme roll-out

- Government invited hosts to register on national portal open pipeline of registrations and self-arranged matches
- ▶ Live **14 March 2022** with limited notice 12-month scheme only
- Visa required initially 6-months, extendable to 3-years
- Min 6-month /max 12-month host commitment. Placements can fail anytime
- ▶ LA's tasked with delivery immediate pressures and high public expectation
- Stand-up processes at pace fast-moving situ/solutions found quickly across tiers.
 Collaborative Team Devon effort
- Limited national guidance delivery in front of guidance. Subsequent updates mean adjusting approach
- Challenges with quality of national portal data

Requirements & challenges

Immediate – short term (Day 1 and ongoing)

- People checks all adults in host household require safeguarding and DBS checks - DCC
- Property and needs checks
 - all properties require condition and safety checks and assessments against specific needs of matched Ukrainian family
- Payments one-off subsistence payments to Ukrainian guests (cash/no UK bank a/c) and rolling monthly 'thank you' payments to hosts

Short - medium term (0-3 months and ongoing)


- Wraparound support from welcome and welfare visits, to grants, mediation, specialist support, English language and small grants
- Re-matching –
 implementing new process
 to rematch guests to new
 hosts within HfU scheme if
 placements fail

Medium – longer term (3-12 months and ongoing?)

- Wider support enhanced English language for employment, access to employment
- Scheme exit strategy? what happens after 6-12 months/end of scheme?
- Access to rented
 accommodation new
 pressures/quickly within
 existing housing crisis role
 of DHC/social and
 affordable/market

Local Mid Devon delivery team

- Simon Newcombe lead / link into Team Devon & DLUHC
- ► To date...delivery (largely) achieved by existing staff due to pace of situation unsustainable. Reviewing additional support & backfill from funding



Current position

- Weekly data provided by DCC (via portal) to districts
- As of 30 May:
 - 86 host households / >165 guests matched in Mid Devon distributed widely across area
 - >80 guests with visas already arrived in 36 households
 - Additional 8-10 new hosts/20+ guests through new matches weekly
 - **Top 3** LA in Devon
- DCC host DBS checks and follow-up children welfare checks/visits
- MDDC Public Health team:
 - accommodation checks and safety assessment initial tranche of inspections complete undertaking new visits on rolling basis (diverting resource from other statutory work)
 - administering payments systems fully live £200 per Refugee on arrival via Post Office Payout system to bridge the gap until UC in place - £350 per month in arrears to hosts

Current position – wraparound support

- Collaborative web page advice + guidance for guests / sponsors https://www.devon.gov.uk/supporting-ukraine/
- Focus on local support via voluntary sector commissioning (varies by district)
- \triangleright Part of £10.5k per head funding used to pay for commissioning. Agreed at Team Devon all districts consider:
 - Focus on self-resilience and capacity over time
 - Developing support offers for guests and hosts
 - Welcome visit and further visits (depending on agreement term 6 months initially)
 - Providing single point of contact for all and signposting to all services
 - Case management
 - Social Networking and Ukraine community groups links / events / drop-in cafes / hubs
 - Specialist support access to UC, housing advice and employment law
 - ESOL English Language lessons (DCC co-ord)
- Reviewing potential enhanced English language, mediation, community transport support, employment access, local DWP arrangements, small flexible grants for essential items and leisure offer

What have we commissioned?

MDDC have already commissioned CHAT and CAB locally







- CHAT hosting dedicated worker from Devon Ukrainian Association for welcome visits and case management
- CAB extending services into bespoke HfU offer (dedicated hours/contact) for specialist benefit, housing and employment advice
- Dedicated MDDC email <u>refugeehelp@middevon.gov.uk</u>

Why support matters?

- Investment now = dividends later and reduced risks
- Retain placements & reduce impact if breakdown
- Re-matching facilitation
- UK and local community integration with safety net / social networks
- Resilience & independence hosting and after
 (practical skills / gaining + sustaining employment and housing)
- Widest access to statutory services
- Families with young children particular needs
- Specialist tailored advice / advocacy (hosts and guests)
- Mediation difficult placements
- Emotional support & well-being unique refugee group / vulnerability
- Transport / mobility

Funding

- 12-month national commitment only
- Districts will apply to Government directly for recovery of monthly host payments
- Separate £10.5k per head payment into top tier (DCC). Team Devon £ partnership agreement to share:
 - 60% districts direct costs & local commissioning
 - 15% county direct costs & Devon-wide commissioning
 - 25% all tiers/LAs pooled contingency
- Team Devon agreement with CEs/Leaders for sign-off
- On current projections: 60% for Mid Devon circa £1m (assumptions)

Funding – costs

Direct needs & costs identified so far:



Statutory support & re-matching

- Statutory rights same as UK residents (while visa valid)
- Access to statutory services by 'business as usual' procedures need to navigate the same systems as UK residents
 - Health GPs, dentists, access to essential meds
 - Education school places, special needs etc.
 - Benefits/DWP UC, other benefits and employment
 - Household Support Fund
 - Homelessness if hosting arrangements breakdown are regarded as statutorily homeless (LA duty)
- Re-matching critical new part of HfU scheme, just gone live nationally with local rollout. Identify / conduct pre-checks on a pool of reserve hosts

Housing and other risks

- Placements fails / end of scheme homeless duty like any other presentation with no locality test – exceptional demand?
- Cost of temporary accommodation (£ outstrip scheme funds?)
- Pressure on existing teams and services scheme delivery, ongoing checks, inspections/payments, commissioning and management, increasing caseload
- Private sector housing market /social housing what housing crisis?
- National exit strategy after scheme ends?
- Need to prepare for a surge in housing demand originating from all schemes – hundreds of people/dozens of families?
- Vulnerability of individuals trauma, 'free-market' matching process, exploitation, modern slavery and safeguarding
