It was reported that two camping tents were currently present at the site. To notify MDDC accordingly.

5. **Casual Vacancy**.

The Notice of Vacancy had been completed and posted. If ten, or more, electors on the Bow Electoral Register haven't written to MDDC requesting a by-election, within the timeframe, the vacancy would be filled by co-option.

6. DCC (Crediton Rural Division) Monthly Report.

Cllr Cairney would endeavour to ensure that a report was provided each month, for both DCC and MDDC. He conveyed that DCC was looking to put forward a motion to ban mobile phones, with internet connection, in schools – some Members had expressed doubt that the suggestion would be workable.

7. MDDC (Upper Yeo & Taw Ward) Monthly Report.

A report for June 2025 had not been received.

8. <u>Untaxed Vehicle (silver Volkswagen reg. no. WV55WPO), Jackman Car Park.</u>

An untaxed (tax expired 30/4/25) silver Volkswagen car, with MoT expired 13/3/25, had been in Jackman car park for some weeks. A resident's complaint had been received. Enquiries as to vehicle's owner had been made of Parish Councillors and a Notice had been placed on the windscreen. If the vehicle is not removed, it will be reported to MDDC who will arrange for it's removal, at the cost of the vehicle's owner.

9. St Martin's Close Play Area and Sanders Road (wild flowers vs trimmed grass)

A MDDC officer had approached Ward Members and Parish Council for views on the following -

MDDC had, informally, allowed a St Martin's Close parishioner to establish wild flowers in the narrow grass strip abutting the play area at St Martins Close. This had been agreed, with local consultation and consensus, in the expectation of no complaint, however, MDDC had received a complaint from a parent who's child had refused to use the play area 'because it was such a mess'.

MDDC had also received a request from a Sanders Rd resident asking for MDDC to refrain from cutting the grass, in part, on the verge to the right going into the Langford estate.

Before consulting with residents local to each site, MDDC requested Parish Council opinion. Parish Council discussed, it was felt the play area grass strip should be kept trimmed (Members opined that long grass around the site was not ideal, children might have allergies, dog fouling could become an issue). Reference the Sanders Road site, given it was understood that it was in private ownership, therefore it was not within Parish Council's jurisdiction. MDDC would be advised accordingly.

10. Local Government Reorganisation, English Devolution White Paper.

MDDC had issued a press release, which outlined it's preferred option, for the future structure of council service delivery, known as the 1-4-5 plan, it proposed:

- Retaining the Plymouth unitary authority on its existing boundary (1)
- A unitary authority combining the South Hams, Teignbridge and West Devon areas with Torbay (4)
- A unitary authority including Mid, East, North Devon, Torridge and Exeter (5)

This would mean the current councils of Mid Devon District Council and Devon County Council would no longer exist and council services would be delivered by a single council. Before MDDC, with district partners, submitted the final proposal, they wanted to know what mattered to residents in the communities and the needs and aspirations of people living/working in the area, so had issued a short survey (open until 11/8/2025), link

which had been circulated to Members.
Cllr Cairney reported that uncertainty existed and the CEO was uncertain of future intentions. Somerset Council had proved very costly and Cornwall Council was said to be nearly bankrupt.

11. D.C.C. Highways Matters.

Speeding A3072 western approach to village (DCC suggested highway works), Burston Cross area. Still nothing had been received or heard from DCC. Possibly Cllr Cairney could assist.

Vehicle Activated Speed Sign (VAS). Nothing had been heard or received from DCC. Information on background was being compiled, enabling Mr P P W Edworthy to make a video (speeding issues had been a regular feature on Parish Council's agendas from since, at least, 2016 – Parish Council had been pursuing an extension of the 30 mph speed limit (to include the garden centre) since 2016, which had failed as it did not meet DCC Policy; thereafter a departure from DCC Policy had been pursued throughout 2019-2021, which also failed; acquisition of a VAS had since been pursued. Cllr Cairney would be meeting with DCC Neighbourhood Highways officer, Mr Tucker, the following day so enquiries would be made.

Other Highway matters. Overgrown hedge/tree growth, along south side of the A3072 west of Bow village, was adversely affecting visibility for traffic exiting the Co-op shop car park, it needed cutting back. To report to DCC. To send email, detailing required DCC actions reference the aforementioned three issues, to Cllr Cairney in readiness for his meeting with Mr Tucker the following day.

15. Any Other Business.

(i) Bow Waterworks. Responding to an enquiry, the Clerk (also Clerk to the Trustees of Bow Waterworks) reported on the current water loss/water leak issue. MDDC Env Health had served a Notice of Unwholesomeness or Insufficiency of Private Water Supply under section 80 of the Water Industry Act 1991 on Bow Waterworks. Despite a full reservoir being maintained, the ongoing loss of water was adversely affecting pressure and supply to some properties, so 'insufficiency of supply' was experienced. Bottled drinking water was being supplied. Being unable to pinpoint leak source also difficulty engaging companies able to trace and repair leaks, was proving difficult and slow (usual contractor currently unable to assist). Hydrotech had conducted a brief survey but declined to return to complete survey or carry out repair. Advanced Pipe Inspection (UK) Ltd had attended, 1 July, to detect leak(s). Disappointingly, API failed in that undertaking: correlation equipment could not work given mixture of pipework/valves/stopcocks metals, their ground mic could not be used given noisy daytime traffic, the two-man team had elected to stay overnight at Southampton, instead of the Waie Inn as suggested, necessitating a 2½ hour journey each way and the team had not brought a listening stick! Their report, when received, would not have much value. Other companies had been and were being approached.
